Alice Teeter, a native Floridian, graduated from Eckerd College in St. Petersburg. She moved to Atlanta in 1975 "just for the summer" and currently resides in Pine Lake. Finishing Line Press published her fifth book of poetry, Mountain Mother Poems, in 2017. She taught beginning and intermediate poetry writing at Emory University for three years and is an Associate Editor for *Calamaro* in Atlanta. Alice is a member of the Artist Conference Network, a



national coaching community for people doing creative work, and a member of the Atlanta Women's Poetry Collective. With her spouse, Kathie deNobriga, she hosts a monthly Art Salon where artists of all kinds present finished work or work in progress to an intimate and appreciative audience.

**Sandra Meek** is the author of five books of poems, including *An Ecology of Elsewhere* (Persea Books, 2016), *Road Scatter* (2012), and *Biogeography*, winner of the Dorset Prize (Tupelo 2008. Her sixth book of poems, *Still*, is forthcoming in 2020. She edited the anthology, *Deep Travel: Contemporary American Poets Abroad* (2007), awarded a 2008 Independent Publisher

Book Award Gold Medal. Her poems have appeared in *The American Poetry Review, Poetry, The Kenyon Review, Prairie Schooner,* and *The Iowa Review,* among others. A recipient of a 2011 NEA Fellowship in Poetry and the 2015 Lucille Medwick Memorial Award from Poetry Society of America, she has three times been awarded Georgia Author of the Year in Poetry and twice the Peace Corps Writers Award in Poetry—she served as a Peace Corps volunteer in Botswana, 1989-1991. ### Members at Large:

**Michael Diebert (2<sup>nd</sup> year)** Michael Diebert is past president of GPS and the author of the collection *Life Outside the Set.* He teaches writing and literature at Perimeter College, Georgia State University, where he also serves as poetry editor for *The Chattahoochee Review.* A two-time cancer survivor, Michael lives in Avondale Estates, Georgia with his wife and dogs.

**Ed Hall** Alabama escapee and lifelong Southerner Edward Austin Hall co-edited the 2013 anthology *Mothership: Tales from Afrofuturism and Beyond*, which *The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction* suggested might be "one of the most important sf anthologies of the decade." He also co-edited a 2017 Philip K. Dick-themed issue of Atlanta-based ART PAPERS magazine. His poetry has appeared in *Eyedrum Periodically* and *Catalyst.* Hall's first novel is forthcoming.

**Kristin Gorell** Kristin Gorell holds an MA in history from Stanford University and an MFA from Georgia State in painting and performance. She began her creative path writing poetry at Naropa Institute as well as the University of Colorado Boulder. Her body of work includes a variety of mediums: writing, painting, drawing, several types of live theater, and film. She teaches at Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia.
