Her full-length poetry collection, *Untying the Knot* (Aldrich Press, 2014), is a story of loss and healing, written "with grace, humor, self-awareness and without a dollop of self-pity" (according to Poet Thomas Lux). Karen's publishing credits also include *Poetry East*, *Atlanta Review*, *POEM*, *The Sow's Ear Poetry Review*, and the *Southern Poetry Anthology Vol 5: Georgia* (Texas Review Press).



Laurence Holden (Guest Reader)

Laurence Holden, a writer and visual artist, lives in the North Georgia Mountains, drawing his images and poems from his connection to the land there. He believes that image and word are just two natural dialects for the same thing—bearing witness to the Creation. He believes that if we can restore our understanding of the land, we might save ourselves too in these perilous times.

His poems have appeared in three issues of the Chrysalis Reader (Lenses on Reality, Your Turn, and It's a Deal: Dynamic Transactions), as well as in Appalachian Heritage, 2011, four recent issues of The Reach of Song: The Poetry Anthology of the Georgia Poetry Society, and The Written River 2012. His work received awards of excellence from the Georgia Poetry Society, an honorable mention from the Byron Herbert Reece Society and from the Porter Fleming Award. His paintings have appeared in over 20 solo exhibits, and are in over 200 public, private, and corporate collections. His art and writing may be viewed at

In addition to his poetry in print, Laurence gives frequent readings and leads hikes in the North Georgia mountains, reading poems along the way and often inviting participants to join him in creating a group poem. He also joins his poems with his visual work, creating limited edition books, essays, and "poem movies." If coming from Atlanta via Interstate 985, take Exit 22 and turn left at the end of the ramp. Go approximately 1.5 miles to the 9th traffic light and turn right onto Academy St. The Burd Center will be on your left about a block down the street. You may park in any of the parking lots on either side of the street. Our meeting is in the Banks Recital Hall to the right as you enter Burd Center.

If coming south from Clayton, GA area on Rt. 23 that becomes Interstate 985, take Exit 22 and turn left at the end of the ramp. Go approximately 1.5 miles to the 8th light and turn right onto Academy St. The Burd Center will be on your left about a block down the street. Your may park in any of the parking lots on either side of the street. Our meeting is in the Banks Recital Hall to the right as you enter Burd Center.

If coming south on Rt. 60 from Dahlonega area, you will be on Thompson Bridge Rd., which becomes Green Street. Use the left lane on Green Street and watch for the Post Office on the left. When you pass the Post Office, Green Street becomes E. E. Butler Street. Stay in the left lane. (Academy St. is the first left but left turns aren't allowed.) Go one more block to Brenau Ave. and turn left. Watch for parking lot on your left which connects Brenau Ave. with Academy Street. You will be able to see the Burd Center from the parking lot between these two streets. Our meeting room is in the Banks Recital Hall to the right when you enter Burd Center. (continued page 5)

If coming south on Rt. 129 from Cleveland, GA area, don't take the bypass when 129 goes left onto Limestone Parkway outside Gainesville. Stay straight on Rt. 11 and follow it until it makes a slight left at a traffic light onto Green Street. Use the left lane on Green St. and watch for the Post Office on the left. When you pass the Post Office, Green St. becomes E. E. Butler St. Stay in the left lane. (Academy St. is the first left, but left turns aren't allowed.) Go one more block to Brenau Ave. and turn left. Watch for parking lot on your left which connects Brenau Ave. with Academy Street. You will be able to see the Burd Center from the parking lot between these two streets. Our meeting room is in the Banks Recital Hall to the right when you enter Burd Center.

Poetry News

A Remembrance of Byron Herbert Reece (1917 - 1958)

While in North Georgia for the October GPS meeting, GPS members may also want to note that the Byron Herbert Reece farm is just south of Blairsville. (The Bettie Sellers Poetry Contest, sponsored by the Byron Herbert Reece Society, has a deadline in May of each year.) Reece taught at Young Harris College in Georgia and is known for five volumes of poetry and two novels. His life was cut short at the age of 40 by depression and illness.

GPS member Homer Overstreet had the unique experience of taking an English literature class with Byron Herbert Reece, and he shares some of his remembrances.

ENGLISH LIT WITH BYRON HERBERT REECE

Mr. Reece walks into the classroom. He pulls the class roll out of his coat pocket, looks it over, and puts it back. His skin fits loosely over his skeleton; not much flesh between skin and skeleton. He would blend in with the mountain men sitting around at the gas station just off campus. He is a mountain man, a farmer and a poet of some note. His brown Chevrolet is parked just outside of the Administration building and our classroom is in the basement. It is a good car but has never been polished. The brown Harris Tweed sport coat must be the only coat he owns. The white shirt, tie, coat, and slacks, hang on his tall frame. He does not look well. He has only been out of the hospital for a few months. He picks up the big red English Literature book, flips pages until he finds his place. Today he is talking about the English ballad, one of his favorite subjects. He talks without notes for the rest of the class, gives the homework assignment and dismisses the class. Few students ask questions. We sat and listened. He seldom called on students. For the life of me I do not remember much about his lectures, except that I enjoyed them and the class seemed to end too soon. This was 1957 and my second year at Young Harris College in the mountains of northeast Georgia. It was a two year college at that time.


