

# Fall Quarterly Meeting Sandy Springs Atlanta-Fulton County Library

Theresa Davis is an educator, storyteller, poet, author, poetry slam champion and the host of the award-winning open mic Java Speaks. She has performed on stages across the nation as a poet and keynote speaker. In May 2013, her first full collection of poems, *After This We Go Dark*, was published by Sibling Rivalry Press. *After This We Go Dark* became an American Library Association Honoree, and the book can



now be checked out in local and college libraries around the world. Her latest poetry collection, *Drowned: A Mermaid's Manifesto*, released with Sibling Rivalry Press in fall of 2016, was included on the Georgia Center for the Book's list of ten *Books All Georgians Should Read 2017.* 

Amy Pence authored the poetry collections *Armor, Amour* (Ninebark Press), *The Decadent Lovely* (Main Street Rag), and the chapbook *Skin's Dark Night* (2River Press). Her hybrid book on Emily Dickinson, *[It] Incandescent*, was

released by Ninebark in 2018 and won the Eyelands Poetry Award in Athens, Greece. A new chapbook, Your Posthumous Dress: Remnants from the Alexander McQueen Collection, is just out from dancing girl press. New poems are forthcoming in Denver Quarterly and Glass: A Journal of Poetry. She tutors high school students in Atlanta and lives in Pine Lake.

The Library is located about 2 blocks east of Roswell Rd., about 3/4 mile north of I-285. It sits in a fork of Johnson Ferry Road and Mount Vernon Highway.

From Interstate 285, exit Roswell Road northbound. Continue 3/4 mile to Mt. Vernon Highway; turn right. Travel down Mt. Vernon through 2 traffic lights; the library will be on your right. Parking lots are on each end of the building.

GPS member Steven Shields will read October 26 from his second full collection, *Creation Story*. # Ron Self: On Writing Poetry

I've been trying to write poetry for most of my life. My grandmother saved some of my earliest work, rhyming doggerel printed in crayon when I was eight years old. At fifteen, I bought ten copies of a book called *Treasures of Parnassus Best Poems of 1962*, a scam that would publish anyone willing to buy the books. That same year, my first magazine publication appeared in the *Beta Club Journal*, and by eighteen I was writing and being paid for a "Poem of the Week" column in the *Avondale Sun* newspaper. I've been at it ever since.


I'm still trying to learn how to write poetry. One of the best ways to learn is to read the poetry of others, so I have read and continue to read all kinds of poetry, some good, some bad, some worth my time and some not. The next best way to learn how to write poetry is to just write poetry. As Epictetus put it in ancient Rome, "If you want to be a writer, write." Or, as Ernest Hemingway taught in his first rule for writers: "apply the seat of the pants to the seat of the chair." Put words down on paper and see where they take you. Work at it.

What do I mean by work in the context of writing a poem? Sure, there's no heavy lifting, but there is hard work to be done. It's a combination of many things, but the primary one is just to show up, sit down at the keyboard or at your desk or wherever it is you do your writing and write. If you wait for the muse to whisper in your ear, if you wait for inspiration to strike you, you'll write very little poetry, and it probably won't be memorable poetry. The real poet doesn't sit around waiting for lightning to strike and set fire to an idea for a poem. The real poet gathers fuel for the poem, reads, researches, keeps his or her eyes and ears open, observes the world around him or her, asks questions, makes comparisons, then takes all that fat lighter, that straw, those sticks, twigs, branches, logs, wadded up balls of discarded paper, and lays the fire for a poem.

Then he or she rubs the sticks together, tries out a line or two, makes a word list, an idea list, strikes the flint of one word against the steel of another to make a spark that might ignite the tender core of a poem-to-be. Then by continued effort, writing, imitating, stringing together nonsense or stream of consciousness, the fire catches, begins to grow. And then the poet keeps feeding that fire, tossing in anything he or she has to hand, a pile of old clichés, childhood memories, hopes, dreams, desires, fantasies, pain, suffering, hope, joy, to see if it will blaze up into a poem. And all the time the poet has no real idea what kind of light or heat the fire will generate, where the poem is going, until suddenly it's there: a blazing bonfire or a little campfire or just a candle flickering, burning in the night, but a poem the poet has worked hard to make, worked hard to create.

Logan Bleckley, late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century Georgia Supreme Court justice, worked hard to craft his legal opinions. Here's how he described his method: "I reconsider, revise, scrutinize, revise the scrutiny, and scrutinize the revision."

That's pretty much how I write poetry. That first draft is just the beginning. You've still got a lot of work to do.

Her poem "She Knows the Names of Shells" (first published in the *Valparaiso Review*) was a finalist out of more than 2,000 entries for the *Lascaux Review's* Poetry Prize and will be included in their anthology. Karen also has a poem in the new anthology *A Compendium of Kisses* (Terrapin Books).

One winner is chosen with a prize of \$50. One honorable mention is chosen. Both winner and HM receive certificates. Winners to be published in the Group's newsletter. The winner and HM will be announced at the Group's meeting on December 7, 2019.

The entry fee is five dollars, payable to "Johnscreekpoetry" via PayPal, or in cash or check at the meeting of the Group on October 5, 2019 at the Alpharetta Library.

Deadline for the entry and fee is Saturday, November 2, 2019 at 12:00 Noon.

Please adhere to these guidelines. Failure to do so may result in disqualification.

# **Guidelines:**

- 1. Entrants must be 18 years or older and a resident of Georgia. Entrants do not need to be a member of JCPG, though we encourage you to join us.
- 2. Poems may be on any topic and use any form but should be no longer than 40 lines, not including blank lines.
- 3. Poems must be in English. They must be typed or word-processed. They must have a title.
- 4. Poems must avoid obscenities, profanities, or subject matter that is racist or homophobic.
- 5. Please use single spacing. Please use a readable font.
- 6. The entry must be original, unpublished in any form, and cannot have not won any other contest.
- 7. No more than one poem may be submitted per entrant.
- 8. Email your poem to: <u>johnscreekpoetry@gmail.com</u>. Please write in the subject box: Poem Entry Your last name. Example, **Poem Entry Smith**. Include your contact information and the title of your poem in the email but not on the poem. Include the poem as an attachment with no name or contact information on the poem.
- 9. Judge(s) are not associated with the Johns Creek Poetry Group.
