Jericho Brown and Dan Veach to judge new GPS contests in 2020

It is a momentous start to a new decade for the Georgia Poetry Society. After many years of GPS running several small annual contests, the board determined early in 2019 that a fresh approach was needed to attract more poets. Following much research, a proposal for significant change to its contests was sent fall 2019 to the Society's membership for comment.

On November 15, 2019, a new, major competition, the **Byron Herbert Reece Award**, with a single prize of \$1000, was announced as open for submissions. **Jericho Brown** will be this year's BHR Award judge.

An annual **Georgia Poetry Society Member Contest**, with prizes, was also announced, which this year will be judged by **Dan Veach**.

The General Submission category (no prizes) and the biennial **Charles Dickson Chapbook Contest** will both continue. GPS Youth Contests are due for revision and have not been held this year. Member input on their review is welcomed.

This has been a significant task by the board, having set itself a goal to keep Georgia Poetry Society's anthology fresh and relevant as the organization moves into its fifth decade. Special thanks are owed to Miriam Jacobs, Trish Percival, and Andrea Jurjević, who spearheaded the project, and to many others, including current and former board members and GPS contest chairs, who provided invaluable advice.

Featured main reader **Jericho Brown** is the recipient of a Whiting Writers' Award and fellowships from the John Simon Guggenheim Foundation, the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Study at Harvard University, and the National Endowment for the Arts. Brown's first book, Please (2008), won the American Book Award. His second book, The New Testament (2014), won the Anisfield-Wolf Book Award and was named one of the best of the year by Library Journal, Coldfront, and the Academy of American Poets. He is also the author of the collection The Tradition (2019), which was long listed for the 2019 National Book Award. His poems have appeared in Buzzfeed, The Nation, The New York Times, The New Yorker, The New Republic, Time, and The Pushcart Prize Anthology, and several volumes of The Best American Poetry anthologies. He is an associate professor and the director of the Creative Writing Program at Emory University in Atlanta. https://blueflowerarts.com/artist/jerichobrown/

The Library is in the center of Decatur, on Sycamore Street (one block south of East Ponce de Leon Avenue) between Church Street and N Candler Street.

Free parking for the patrons of the Decatur Library is limited. He is Past President of the Georgia Poetry Society and has served on its Board several times.

Alyson Shields, Vice President: Alyson is a Midwestern daisy replanted below the Mason-Dixon Line. During the day, she writes and reads the news for all the flowers in the Piedmont. At night, she blooms creatively with the help of a blue pen and to the delight of her rescue pets. While her journalistic works have created a garden of facts and stories, her creative works are just beginning to bud publicly.

Lyn Hopper, **Treasurer** (continuing): Lyn Hopper grew up on the Georgia coast and lives in the mountains near Dahlonega with her husband of 43 years and a spirited cat. After a 30-year career in public library leadership, she is enjoying part-time work as an office manager for an environmental nonprofit, Georgia ForestWatch. Andrea Jurjević (continuing): Andrea is the author of *Small Crimes*, winner of the 2015 Philip Levine Poetry Prize, and a translator whose book-length translations from Croatian include *Mamasafari* (Diálogos Press, 2018) and *Dead Letter Office* (The Word Works, 2020). She teaches at Georgia State University in Atlanta, Georgia.

John Ottley, Jr.: Education: Davidson College (AB), Columbia University (MS), Army Command and General Staff College, and Army War College. Awards: first place, Byron Herbert Reece Contest (x4), Master Army Aviator Badge, Expert Infantryman Badge, SAO Distinguished Service. Poetry Activities: Judged 42 poetry contests; published 3 poetry books, 2 non-poetry books, and was editor and publisher, *Midwest Poetry Review*, 5 years. Leadership: GPS president and treasurer. NFSPS treasurer five years. Cover story: *Aviation History*, September 2014. History lectures: 5.

Ann Willis: MA, English, UW-Milwaukee. Ann W. lives with her husband and their adopted greyhound in Habersham County. The Side Door Poets: GPS New Writing Group Membership Initiative

The Side Door Poets have recently taken advantage of the Georgia Poetry Society's new program granting discounted membership fees to writing groups of 10 persons or more who all join. Writing group members utilizing this new program may also request to be a featured group at a Quarterly Meeting, particularly if they want to help organize a meeting in their hometown.

Featured reading group at the January 2020 quarterly meeting, The Side Door Poets is a poetry critique/support group started and administered by Karen Paul Holmes. Since 2009 they have been meeting once a month to share and discuss each other's work. Several original members met through the community workshops hosted by Poetry@Tech, a program started by Thomas Lux when he became the Bourne Chair of Poetry at Georgia Tech. The group has grown and changed members over the years but maintains a steady membership of about 20 poets.

The poets who will read at the 2020 Winter Quarterly Meeting will include as many of the following Side Door Poets as available on January 25, 2020. They will divide approximately an hour among them: Karen Paul Holmes, Diana Anhalt, Maggie Blake Bailey, Jesse Breite, Ricks Carson, Jennifer Dracos, Rupert Fike, Erin Ganaway, Andrea Jurjevic, Jim Langford, Kathleen Lewis, Sally Mohney, Patricia Percival, Jane Simpson, and Dan Veach. Collectively, these poets have had 23 chapbooks and books published since the Side Doors formed.

The Side Doors are a very diverse group. Like founder Holmes, many had or still have careers in other fields. Several teach English or creative writing or have retired from doing so or editing. Side Door Poets have been published in a wide array of journals and won recognition for their work. Jurjevic has won the Robinson Jeffers Tor House prize and her book, *Small Crimes*, was awarded the Philip Levine Prize for Poetry. Ganaway and Mohney both won Texas Review Breakthrough Prizes, for Georgia and North Carolina, respectively. The group boasts three Georgia Author of the Year for Poetry recipients, Jurjevic, Veach and Simpson. Fike's second poetry collection, *Hello the House*, won the Haas Poetry Prize from Snake Nation Press and was named one of the "Books All Georgians Should Read, 2018" by The Georgia Center for the Book. Several Side Doors have been nominated for Pushcart Awards, and Holmes has had poems featured by Garrison Keillor and Tracy K. Smith on their podcasts. Both Veach and Jurjevic have published English translations of poets writing in other languages.

The GPS hopes this new membership initiative will both grow its membership and promote the work of groups around the state. If your group is interested in a group membership, please contact any of the Officers or Board Members for more information.

In the News: The Healing Power of Poetry?

If, as William Congreve wrote, music has charms to soothe a savage beast, poetry apparently can calm the beasts of illness which savage our bodies. An article in the December 2, 2019 *Wall Street Journal* states that physicians are using poetry to perk up the seriously ill.

Dr. Joshua Hauser's patient, a 68-year-old former Marine at the Jesse Brown VA Hospital in Chicago, asked to be read *Invictus* by William Ernest Henley. When Hauser read the immortal line "I am the master of my fate," his patient replied: "Yes. I'm, not gonna roll up in no ball and cry because I've got cancer. I'm tired but it's not the kind of tired where I'm giving up."

The *Journal* reports that physicians are interviewing patients after poetry readings to determine whether their quality of life and relationships with their doctors have improved. Dr. Hauser said he thought that poetry caused his patients to reflect on their illnesses in ways that direct questioning might not.

At Huntsman Cancer Institute in Salt Lake City, cancer patients can dictate poetry while receiving chemotherapy—a teaspoon of honey making the poison go down, if you will. In Boston, Dr. Rafael Campo, who edits the poetry section of the *Journal of the AMA*, is quoted as saying, "We don't always have a cure in medicine, but poetry actually can heal in a broader sense."

At a children's cancer center in Akron, OH, a "narrative medicine coordinator" averred that poetry workshops enable patients, their families, and staff to "see themselves in a poem." One patient remarked that he "realized the healing process of poetry" and affirmed that it helped him find his way in life—even in times of darkness.

According to the article, reading poetry to patients also may help relieve doctor burnout.

A feverish passion for underlying form has always been the engine driving artist **rEN**'s (Ralph Dillard's) work. The Germantown section of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, is where he began his professional career. With more than 2,800 murals, Philly boasts the greatest number of large-scale public paintings of any city in the world. Living and interacting with the people of this community during some of his most impressionable years heavily impacted the style he is known for today. Using a wide variety of rich colors in the oil medium, **rEN** aims to give viewers a glimpse into the world he sees behind his eyes. The focus of his work has always been to communicate ideas that challenge people to be curious about their own internal nature. He hopes people will see themselves in his works. "They are as much about you as they are about me," he says.
